- c. Can Krogstad be considered a foil to Helmer in Ibsen's *A Doll's House*? Justify your answer.
- d. Comment on Nora's decision at the end of the play, in *A Doll's House*.
- e. Comment critically on the role of the Gods in Brecht's *The Good Woman of Szechwan*.
- f. How does Brecht's *The Good Woman of Szechwan* comment on the position of women in society?
- g. Comment critically on two major themes of Ionesco's *Rhinoceros*.
- h. Examine briefly Ionesco's *Rhinoceros* as an absurd play.
- 2. Answer *any three* of the following questions:

10X3=30

- a. Nora, in Ibsen's *A Doll's House*, is a victim of traditional gender role expectations. Critically comment.
- b. Examine the important social issues represented in Ibsen's A Doll's House.
- c. Is *Waiting for Godot* a black comedy? Answer with reference to Becket's use of humour in the play.
- d. How do the tragicomic predicaments of Estragon and Vladimir represent the existential crisis in *Waiting for Godot*.

e. (i) Comment on the use of allegory in Ionesco's Rhinoceros.

(ii) Shen Te's fate in Brecht's *The Good Woman of Szechwan* is a commentary on the relation between love and goodness. Justify.
